Cumberland County Conducts Full Scale Active Shooter Exercise

On August 23, 2019, Cumberland County successfully conducted its first full scale "Active Threat Integrated Response and Rescue Task Force Exercise" at Lakeside Middle School in Millville, NJ. The operation, dubbed "Operation Active Shooter Survival", was planned with guidance from the FBI, the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the Office of Homeland Security.

Operation Active Shooter Survival presented a live, realistic, real time school shooter scenario requiring an integrated response from the region's law enforcement, fire and rescue departments, Office of Emergency Management as well as emergency medical services, including hospital trauma facilities. Police, fire and emergency medical services departments from Millville, Bridgeton and Vineland worked with the Cumberland County Sheriff's

Department and Prosecutor's Office to develop and implement an integrated response to the simulated attack utilizing a centralized chain of command and collective resources. With assistance from the FBI Crisis Response Unit and the NJ State Police, a scenario was prepared that would mimic the types of active shooter threats seen on numerous occasions over the last several years.

Preparation for the exercise required candid assessments of the capabilities of various departments and agencies. Chain of command and communication protocols were developed to address the acute nature of the risk active shooter events pose which put a premium on rapid assessment, deployment and decision-making. To make the exercise as realistic as possible, preparation for the exercise required the inclusion of school officials, County officials tasked with emergency management and public information as well as public observers such as the news media. The exercise required a number of "players" to play the roles of shooters and victims.

Any active shooter crisis immediately challenges the area's Pg. 5 emergency medical services and its hospital trauma centers. In cooperation with Inspira Health Network's nearby Vineland Hospital, the exercise produced a comprehensive plan for emergent triage, transportation and treatment of victims. Genesis Healthcare, which operates a rehabilitation and long-term healthcare facility near Lakeside School, participated in the exercise providing a realistic site for both law enforcement and emergency medical operations.

To enhance the realism of the exercise, the details of the exercise were not disclosed to the "players". The participants were forced to assess the threat, develop a strategy to assess the threat, marshal the resources to neutralize the threat and treat the victims. The exercise produced a "crisis" atmosphere that emphasized the need for clear communication, timely decision-making and well understood procedures to reduce confusion and miscommunication.

Cumberland County officials believe the exercise was highly successful for both what went right and what went wrong. In planning the exercise, the FBI advised county and municipal officials that the exercise would, likely produce mistakes and expose weaknesses that are often more valuable learning experiences than successes. With that advice in mind, exercise participants are using the results of the simulations to improve communications, tactics, equipment and training. The exercise has produced a spirit of cooperation and collaboration across the County's network of first responders.

Automation in Government Can Pave the Way for Innovation

The private sector has led the charge on automation, and for a good reason: doing so has freed up employee time and company budgets to focus on larger initiatives. Government has been slower to embrace automation. The reasons why are unclear, but it's suspected that the up-front investment in automation could be a barrier. Another reason for the slow adoption of automation could be the misperception that it would eliminate jobs.



A Few Benefits of Making the Switch

Cost Savings:

There are many benefits to making the switch - In procurement, human resources, and finance, McKinsey believes that 60 to 80 percent of tasks are automatable. This could result long-term labor savings of at least 30 percent. The ROI on investing time up-front when setting up automated solutions is massive. Depending on the size of the government, tens of thousands of hours a year can be freed up. As an added bonus, you can guarantee a much higher level of accuracy around your processes.

Employee Satisfaction:

Automation's effects on employee satisfaction could be substantial— manual, repetitive work is frequently cited as one of the main sources of public-sector job dissatisfaction. According to <u>Information Age</u>, "The overwhelming majority (91%) of those using multiple apps or systems see connecting data, applications and systems as a beneficial thing for their organization to do, with 37% deeming it an essential action. In fact, on average, respondents speculated that they could see a 28% boost in efficiency through a greater focus on automation of data processes." What could a team do if given 28% more time during their workday? They could finally work on some of the initiatives that have been put on the backburner due to cost or time restraints.

Improved Citizen Services:

Automation has empowered citizens to accomplish many things online. Some examples, according to McKinsey: The UK Government Digital Service has successfully migrated departmental publishing onto the GOV.UK platform and digitized services, including passport and driver's-license applications. Estonia's tax-filing system allows 95 percent of residents to file their tax returns online, and the US Digital Service has built a digital College Scorecard. Automation of these tasks doesn't put people out of work, but it does create a more pleasant and efficient experience for residents. There is still the need for office workers to keep the system up and running.

Kapsch Receives OmniAir Certification for Connected Vehicle Roadside Units

Kapsch TrafficCom (Kapsch) has received certification for compliance and conformance for its RIS-9160 and RIS-9260 roadside units (RSU) from the OmniAir Consortium association focused on improving processes and products for tolling and connected vehicles (CV). OmniAir Certification is an industry certification that confirms the RSUs meet operational standards set by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) and the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE), and specifications by the United States Department of Transportation (USDOT).

The RSUs were independently tested for Wireless Access in Vehicular Environments (WAVE) and USDOT RSU specification compliance by DEKRA, a European vehicle inspection company, at the company's authorized test laboratory in Malaga, Spain. Each unit enables vehicle-to-infrastructure (V2I) communication when implemented with corresponding in-vehicle OBUs (on-board units). The dual-band RIS-9260 was certified for the DSRC radio setting but has option for users to choose operation between a DSRC and C-V2X communication, ultimately providing customers with the ability to use these RSUs to communicate with certified OBUs from other vendors.

Kapsch is a globally-operating technology corporation for intelligent transportation systems (ITS) with proven connected vehicle solutions that have been implemented in various projects around Europe, the United States, and Australia. 

NJ Architecture Firm Takes School Building Experience South of the Border for Charity

New Jersey architecture and engineering firm LAN Associates is taking on its first international project. The firm is donating design services and expertise to help a Mexican charity called Anchor Children's Ministry (ACM) provide a much-needed educational facility in an impoverished neighborhood in Juarez. When finished, the school will be named Colegio James R. Ganley junior high school, and it will house the 7th-9th graders now crowded into the overflowing Colegio James R. Ganley elementary school, which opened its doors more than a decade ago.



Located on a former landfill in a town where ad hoc housing and dirt roads are the norm, Anchor Children's Ministry transformed the space it was allotted into a solid, fully functional campus that educates hundreds of Mexican students. The school, which has a 99% graduation rate, is built to the same standards one would find here in the U.S., with concrete block, reinforced concrete, steel roof trusses, corrugated metal roofing and windows imported from the U.S. The new junior high is planned to be a two-story, 6,000 square foot facility, that will house a variety of classrooms, offices and lab spaces. The charity has already purchased three plots of land adjacent to the current elementary school, which will be combined to serve as the location for the new junior high.

Like many non-profit projects, Anchor Children's Ministry set out on this expansion without full funding in place. LAN is donating time and expertise to provide the design work that will allow the charity to show the plans to potential donors and raise its needed capital. This process is a familiar undertaking for LAN's Director of Architecture and project leader Matt Wolfe, who has previously worked on pro bono projects in Africa, Honduras, as well as projects in the U.S. such as post Hurricane Sandy boardwalk reconstruction at the Jersey shore and NJ youth facilities in Paterson and Midland Park.

"Often, projects like this start out with the vision and the dream of something big, but without the means to get there," Wolfe explained. "What I've learned is you need to provide imagery, 3D renderings and perspectives that paint the picture and give shape and form to what the project will be. That's what gets people excited, and willing to support the cause."

Wolfe, who joined LAN earlier this year, first got involved with ACM when he volunteered to help design the original elementary school in 2003. Having designed, built and renovated hundreds of schools in the New Jersey area, LAN is known in its industry as an expert on school design. Extending its portfolio beyond the U.S. is a special opportunity for the full-service architecture and engineering firm and doing so for charity makes it even more worthwhile. Eager to jump at the opportunity to help those in need, in June 2019, LAN sent Matt back to Juarez to kick off this project, meet with the non-profit leaders, general contractor and survey the new site. Now the team at LAN has completed concept design and is mid-stride in developing the construction documents necessary for pulling permits and constructing the project. As the design phase is expected to be completed by early fall, the team is targeting construction to start approximately six months later, pending funding and volunteer support.

Anchor Children's Ministry is a Christian non-profit that oversees the private K-9 community school. The charity often faces challenges in covering their budget, instead relying on donations from sponsors to meet most of its students' costs. Atlantic City Electric Completes Targeted Enhancements to Further Improve Service Reliability

With hurricane season upon us, Atlantic City Electric has been hard at work upgrading and enhancing the local energy grid to better serve its customers. As part of this effort, Atlantic City Electric has completed work to upgrade a priority list of distribution lines that serve thousands of customers. Through data-driven analysis, the company's engineers identified and prioritized lines within its service area that have experienced the most interruptions during the past two years.

"We are always working to improve service for our customers," said Doug Mokoid, Atlantic City Electric director of Regional Electric Operations. "Through careful analysis of our data, we identify parts of our energy system where we are not meeting our expectations and we use that data to plan upgrades that will modernize the energy grid and improve service for customers. With the more extreme weather we continue to see each season, this targeted work continues to be critical to making sure we can power our customers when storms hit."

This year, crews upgraded 26 distribution lines within 50 different municipalities in Atlantic, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Ocean and Salem counties to benefit residents in these areas. Distribution lines are power lines you would typically see running through a Cumberland County customers. neighborhood delivering power directly to local homes and businesses.

Crews installed new utility poles and associated energy infrastructure, animal protection, and devices including switches, reclosers, and fuses, to help minimize the number of affected customers if an outage does

occur. Crews also installed innovative technologies to improve system reliability, such as specialized equipment that can automatically restore service more quickly or isolate damage.

Other reliability enhancement work the company performs year-round includes trimming trees that could potentially impact the system, installing steel utility poles capable of withstanding hurricane-force winds, building new substations and installing new equipment at existing substations, building new underground equipment, and installing stronger, tree-resistant aerial cable.

These energy grid enhancements are part of Atlantic City Electric's Atlantic City Electric crews complete reliability enhancement work in a Bridgeton neighborhood to broader strategic effort to modernize and strengthen the local energy modernize and strengthen the local energy grid for grid serving southern New Jersey. 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Nationwide Economics Weekly Economic Review & Outlook for September 30, 2019

Weekly Review

The geopolitical environment has been quite uncertain this year, helping to hold back economic activity. The choppy escalation of trade disputes between the U.S. and China has hung over the business sector and helped to decelerate global growth. The Fed, which came into the year expecting further rate hikes, has reversed course with two rate cuts (and more likely on the way) in response to building risks for the economy, while the yield curve has been partially inverted since May-at a minimum suggesting slower growth ahead, if not recession.

Geopolitical uncertainty has intensified recently, with the formal impeachment inquiry into President Trump as well as suggestions of de-listing Chinese firms from U.S. equity markets as a bargaining tool in trade negotiations. The contentious Brexit discussions ahead of the deadline at the end of the month are likely to cause further uncertainty about the outlook-not just in the U.K. and the E.U., but in the U.S. as well.

Equity markets have weathered the elevated uncertainty relatively well this year. The S&P 500 index has set several all-time highs even as risks for the economy have risen. Financial markets have shown more sensitivity to the news cycle than in the past few years, but average market volatility this year has been near the long-term trend.

More Positive Housing Data

New homes remain the hottest part of the housing market this year with lower mortgage rates and the historically low inventory of existing homes, pushing more homebuyers to new construction. New home sales rose by 7.1 percent for August, even after an upwardly revised figure for July. The annualized sales pace of 713,000 for August is the third highest monthly figure of the current expansion and is up by more than 18 percent compared with August 2018.

Looking ahead, the outlook for new home sales is encouraging with mortgage rates likely to stay low and demand drivers for housing (including jobs, income, and household formations) still strong. The surge in housing starts during August suggests that homebuilders are responding to faster demand by increasing supply.

The National Association of Realtors' pending home sales index rose by 1.6 percent for August, rebounding from a drop the prior month. The rise in pending sales activity along with the recent surge in mortgage applications for home purchases, suggest some upside for existing home sales in coming months.

Mixed Signals From Monthly Consumer Data

The core personal consumption expenditure (PCE) price index rose by only 0.1 percent for August-below the recent trend and weaker than implied by upward movements in the core consumer price index (CPI). Still, this increase pushed up the 12-month growth in the core PCE to 1.8 percent, matching the high for the year. Given the weaker inflation readings from September through December in 2018, there may be some upside potential for the 12-month view over the rest of the year.

Overall PCE spending for August was weaker than expected with a 0.1 percent gain along with a downward revision for July. As a result, annualized real GDP growth for the third quarter has been revised modestly lower to slightly below 2.0 percent.

The Week Ahead

The economic calendar will be busy this week with updates on hiring, unemployment, and wages-as well as business sector surveys and auto sales.

Payroll gains have slowed this year, averaging 156,000 over the past three months-an unsurprising trend with the current expansion now in its eleventh year. While demand from employers remains strong and layoffs are still very low, the pool of unemployed workers continues to shrink-acting to slow the pace of hiring and placing upward pressure on wages. Following a weaker figure for August, we expect job gains to accelerate a bit to 165,000 in September. The unemployment rate, which has been stable over the past three months due to stronger labor market entrants, should edge down to match an expansion low of 3.6 percent. Average hourly earnings should increase by 0.3 percent for the month, keeping the 12-month growth rate around 3.2 percent.

The ISM manufacturing index slipped into contraction territory in August for the first time in three years as trade uncertainty and tariffs have increased uncertainty and weighed on activity. With more respondents noting supply chain disruptions and lost business abroad, the impacts from the trade war could be long-lasting for U.S. manufacturers. The index is likely to edge higher in September but remain slightly below the expansion/contraction line. The non-manufacturing sector has continued to expand solidly despite some negative impacts from trade. For September, the ISM nonmanufacturing index should fall back a bit to 55.8, still indicating further solid expansion for the service sector.

In line with the improved pace of consumers spending this summer, light vehicle sales remain solid, albeit at a pace slightly below that of last year. Purchases of pickup trucks, SUVs, and crossovers continue to lead the way

as demand for passenger cars has faded further. Lower financing rates during September and the beginning of the new 2020 model year should boost sales for September to an annualized pace of 17.3 million units. This would put sales for all of 2019 on a path for 17.0 million, only slightly slower than last year.







Counties across the country have committed to creating data-driven, systems-level plans to reduce the number of people with mental illnesses in their jails. As part of these efforts, many communities are focusing on the small number of people who frequently cycle in and out of emergency rooms, shelters, crisis services and the justice system, a population that disproportionately contributes to the high utilization of these resources. People who come into frequent contact with these systems have some of the highest mental health and substance abuse treatment needs and utilize significant county resources, often without positive outcomes due to a lack of collaboration between the various systems.

In Part 2 of a series on collecting and using data, Stepping Up and the Data-Driven Justice project will host a webinar that features ASSOCIATION counties that have implemented policies and practices that identify of COUNTIES frequent utilizers of these systems and use this information to connect people with appropriate treatment and services.

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FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

NJAC hopes that you'll us on December 20th for NJAC's Annual Summit at the Trenton Country Club where this year we'll examine the alarming increase in suicide rates among teenagers, adults, veterans, and law enforcement professionals. Mental health specialists and other leading authorities will also discuss essential strategies for prevention and recommend resources for providing vital support for those in need. In light of the seriousness of this troubling issue that touches all of us, we're waiving registration fees for State, county, and other public officials. However, space is limited, and you *must* complete and return to us no later than December 13th, the registration form is on our website at www.njac.org.

Separately, on September 23rd, the NJ Council on Local Mandates considered NJAC's complaint that the 2018 vote-by-mail law constitutes an unfunded State mandate and is unconstitutional. Given that the recently enacted 2019 vote-by-mail law

appropriates \$2.0 million to offset the direct expenditures imposed by both laws, which we submit is open to interpretation as noted below, the Council requested NJAC and the Attorney General's office to provide final briefs concerning the actual costs incurred by county governments. In other words, NJAC must demonstrate that both laws cost county governments more than \$2.0 million to implement as an underfunded mandate, which also violates the law and is unconstitutional. NJAC and the Attorney General's office must submit their summations by October 23rd with additional oral arguments likely to follow.

Importantly note, NJAC maintains that the Legislature's \$2.0 million appropriation is illusory as the monies have been placed in reserve pursuant **EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 73.** Moreover, the "2019 Vote-by-Mail Application Reimbursement" form, distributed to the county clerks by the Division of Elections, appears only to apply to the opt-out notices sent to voters for the 2019 general election and does not include reimbursement for the 2018 opt-out notices or the ongoing expenses of issuing vote-by-mail ballots to all voters that voted by mail in the 2016, 2017, and 2018 general elections. As of this writing, the Attorney General's office not has provided any guidance on this matter. Special thanks to Hunterdon County Clerk Mary Melfi and Hunterdon County Board of Elections Administrator Beth Thompson for testifying before the Council this morning and to Hunterdon County Counsel Shana Taylor for her continued advice and counsel. All did a terrific job and we appreciate their help and patience a great deal.
