## The Delta Factor - Active vs. Passive Investing

Local public entities come in all shapes and sizes. From small community colleges and water authorities all the way up to towns, villages, county governments, and cities. Budgets can range from several million dollars to more than one billion dollars annually. One thing that they all have in common? Surplus cash, over and above what is needed for current operating expenses, sitting in their bank accounts that can be put to work generating interest income.

Every municipality or public entity has an adopted investment policy that puts safety of principal at the top of the list of priorities, followed soon after by the requirement that they prudently maximize interest earnings on the funds in their

care and custody. The gap, or "delta," between passively managing those funds vs. using active liquidity management often averages 1.5% to 2.0%. That additional amount may not sound like a lot, but when you are dealing with tens of millions, or sometimes *hundreds* of millions of dollars, **that delta factor can mean the difference between a tax increase or a tax <u>cut!</u>** 

A finance office that uses passive investing basically keeps their funds in two types of accounts: their regular bank account plus a daily money-market account or a daily investment pool. They shift the funds back and forth as needed to meet expenses and earn a somewhat higher rate of interest on the day-to-day balances kept in the money-market account. The downside of passive investing is that it does not take advantage of the significantly higher interest rates that can be found in fixed-term investments such as certificates of deposit and U.S. Treasury bills. Passive investing misses out on the power of tapping into the Future Value (FV) of cash.

On the other hand, active liquidity management uses **future cash-flow forecasting** to predict *how long* those surplus funds will remain on deposit before they will be needed to pay for goods and services. That information is powerful because it can be used to confidently add secure, guaranteed, fixed-term investments to a public entity's portfolio. The result is a much stronger, balanced portfolio of short- and longer-term fixed-rate CDs and T-bills, combined with those existing daily money-market and municipal-pool accounts.

The delta between active cash management vs. passive can be as high as 2.0%. In the case of a medium-sized county with a \$300 million annual budget and an average of \$150 million in cash on deposit, that could mean an **additional \$3 million in operating revenue annually** over and above what they would have earned using passive investing. The delta factor works the same way whether you are managing the finances of a \$30 million public entity or a \$300 million one —and it remains in place regardless of whether interest rates are climbing, flat, or falling.

# **Root Out Stealthy Threats With Managed Detection and Response**

Following a record year for cybercrime, nearly three-quarters of senior IT decision-makers say they are not sure their organizations can fend off increasingly sophisticated cyber threats. Many are turning to managed detection and response (MDR) services to boost their defenses.

MDR is an outsourced security service that gives organizations access to a provider's team of dedicated security analysts and engineers. With the tools, training and manpower that few organizations have in-house, MDR providers help customers rapidly detect, analyze and mitigate even the stealthiest threats.

Faster detection is key to limiting damage. According to a Ponemon Institute study, it takes the average company 206 days to detect a threat and another 73 days to contain it. That means attackers have the better part of a year to rummage around a victim's systems performing reconnaissance, manipulating data and stealing credentials. However, the study further finds that companies can dramatically limit damage and save roughly \$1 million in remediation costs if they can contain a threat within 30 days.

#### **Rapid Containment is Key**

That's a stretch for most organizations, though. In a recent Arctic Wolf survey of more than 1,400 senior IT decision-makers and business executives in the U.S., U.K. and Canada, 74 percent said their in-house security teams lack the ability and expertise to fend off ransomware attacks and other sophisticated threats.

More tools aren't the answer. Organizations commonly have up to 100 different security tools, but most of those are underutilized. In a separate Arctic Wolf survey of cybersecurity pros, 30 percent admitted they don't know how to use all their organization's tools effectively.

What's more, all those tools create an enormous volume of security alerts — IDC analysts say enterprise systems can generate more than 10,000 alerts per month, with more than half of them false alarms. Individually evaluating all those alerts can overwhelm security teams and lead to alert fatigue.

#### **How MDR Can Help**

Leading MDR providers such as Arctic Wolf take the pressure off in-house IT teams with automated detection and response capabilities. The Arctic Wolf system collects, aggregates and analyzes log data from throughout the existing technology stack to identify threats — without requiring the involvement of in-house IT staff. Most residents don't consider what it takes to ensure that their local infrastructure is safe and functional. But a lot goes on behind the scenes of a department of public works. DPW is critical to constructing, maintaining, repairing, and improving local roads, bridges, and other critical government assets.

Public works departments also play an integral role in coordinating emergency responses and extreme weather events. Many employees must remain on-call to respond to critical needs, like repairing traffic lights that have gone out in the middle of the night or clearing snow from roads during a storm. But when

public works departments rely on antiquated workflows for scheduling, recording, and filing paperwork, projects can take longer than anticipated and leave infrastructure inoperable or not functioning at max capacity.

Streamlining these internal processes with government software makes employees' lives easier. In this post, we'll discuss the many projects and programs you must manage as part of your department of public works strategy. Then, we'll share details about how to modernize your department and improve workflows with public works technology.

#### What Does the Local Public Works Department Do?

Departments of public works maintain a community's infrastructure assets, including roads and buildings. Many DPWs have divisions within them to account for the diverse projects that advance a public works strategy. Common public works management responsibilities include:

Fleet maintenance: keeping a local government's fleet (including cars, fire trucks, and police vehicles) operable.

Stormwater management: directing stormwater from streets and to waterways in an environmentally-responsible manner.

Engineering: conducting feasibility studies about where buildings and roads can go and how big they can be. Building maintenance: ensuring municipal buildings are upkept, including routine maintenance and building

system inspections.

Streets and traffic: maintaining street lights and signs, upkeeping streets through resurfacing, and keeping roads clean of debris through street sweeping.

Solid waste: conducting a curbside pickup of a community's waste (for example, trash, recycling, or compost).

In larger municipalities, these divisions might actually be departments all on their own. In smaller communities, however, these activities are often managed by just the public works department. Similarly, a county public works department might differ from a municipal public works department when it comes to the services it provides.

#### How Your Public Works Department Can Improve Its Processes with Technology

Given the many moving parts that make up a department of public works strategy, it can be challenging to manage projects, ensure critical needs are met, and communicate across divisions. Below we discuss the numerous ways government technology can improve processes within your department to overcome these challenges and move your public works department strategy forward.

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Automation of scheduling

Scheduling automation makes it easy for supervisors to create schedules that suit the needs of both employees and the organization. Scheduling software is particularly beneficial in a public works department, given that many roles, like traffic technicians, may need to be on-call or work overtime. Software makes it easier to ensure all shifts are filled and employees aren't overworked.

#### Digital work orders

Many public works employees rely on work orders to frame their to-do lists for the day. Digital work orders make it straightforward for staff to communicate these work needs with one another. Additionally, staff in other departments can submit a request for work (such as facility maintenance needs) to public works personnel, who prioritize this work alongside other critical needs.

#### **Timestamps**

You can also use technology to track timestamps, such as when a work order is first assigned and when it's fulfilled. As a result, you can better encourage accountability across your department by seeing who accomplishes what tasks and when. This tool is particularly helpful regarding data tracking and performance management, which we'll discuss in more detail shortly.

Wondering How to Hold Government Workers Accountable? Here's further considerations.

#### Mobile field devices

The vast majority of work in a public works department occurs in the field. A mobile field device makes it much easier to input information while DPW employees are away from their desks. In this way, a mobile field device eradicates duplicate data entry. Additionally, software like GovInspect pairs with mobile technology and enables employees to access critical data, like property information, while in the field.

#### Digital record storage

Public works departments store a lot of data, from resident records (such as who's signed up for curbside trash pickup) to when the last time a road was resurfaced or how old a building's roof is. Cloud-based government data storage keeps all information in one central location and makes it easier to find information efficiently, rather than sorting through physical file folders or relying on the memories of long-time employees. #### Set recurring tasks

Public works software also makes it easier to set and assign recurring work, so you never forget to complete critical tasks, such as those involved in asset maintenance. For example, you might set recurring tasks to ensure every vehicle in your fleet gets a timely oil change or that all HVAC systems are maintained regularly. #### Digital communications

You can also use technology to streamline communications across all government departments, between divisions, and among supervisors and employees.

Digital government communication tools make it easier for supervisors to maintain connections with staff in the field. This is particularly true for supervisors who must manage employees in multiple locations (for example, a street crew resurfacing a road across town from another team).

#### Real-time data collection

Another key benefit of public works software is that it can automate real-time data collection. This means busy public works employees don't need to add another to-do item to their list because data is collected automatically in real time and stored in the government cloud.

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GIS maps

Employees can use GIS maps to pinpoint locations of infrastructure that need maintenance, repair, inspections, or other attention across your community. This makes it easy for staff to know precisely where to complete work.

You can also use GIS maps to help citizens, business owners, and executive leadership understand where infrastructure projects are taking place in the community. This is a great way to strengthen relationships with local government business partners and residents.

#### Financial data tracking

Given the complexity and scope of public works projects, your department likely has a large budget that includes numerous capital items. DPW software makes it easier to manage your budget, including tracking purchase orders, placeholding carryover funds, prioritizing budget requests, and separating operating versus capital needs.

Complaint management software

Last but not least, you can use technology to make it easier for citizens to report issues that affect the public works department. Complaint management software makes it easy for citizens to report on infrastructure issues, such as potholes, downed street signs, and failed power lights, so public works employees can quickly take action to remedy them.

For example, a management analyst might look at employee time stamps to determine how long it takes to complete certain tasks. 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

### Nationwide Economics Weekly Economic Review & Outlook for January 23, 2023

#### Consumer activity slows to close 2022

The large declines in retail sales in December and November signals that consumer spending lost a lot of steam despite some cooling in inflation as we ended 2022. We see further downside in 2023 as we expect the labor market will start to weaken significantly, which will depress personal income growth. On the housing front, existing home sales fell for an eleventh straight month as prospective homebuyers continue to contend with low inventory and high mortgage rates.

#### Little momentum for the consumer heading into the new year

Consumers continued to pull back on spending as retail sales dropped 1.1 percent in December-a second straight decline of at least one percent. This slowdown suggests a weaker trend for spending heading into 2023. The still elevated inflationary pressures, high borrowing costs, and the reduction of excess pandemic-related savings are restraining consumer purchases.

The decline in sales was more broad-based than in November. The retail sales control group (total sales less autos, gasoline, and building materials) was down 0.7 percent in December. Even when adjusting for declining goods prices, this measure was down 0.4 percent-lower than the 0.3 percent growth seen in November. Discretionary spending continues to take the brunt of household spending cuts, a response to rising prices for many essential items.

The pullback in spending could be a sign that consumers are tightening their belts and aligning their behaviors with higher recession expectations from consumer surveys. Still, the current strong labor market should limit the fall in consumer outlays in the near term. Should employment gains moderate significantly or start to decline, consumer spending should retrench much more sharply, helping to precipitate an expected moderate recession starting by mid-year.

#### Home sales drop for eleventh consecutive month

Existing home sales fell in December to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 4.02 million units, the slowest pace since 2010. For the full year, there were 5.03 million existing home sales in 2022, the lowest since 2012 and well down from 2021's lofty total of 6.12 million sales. The median sales price for an existing home continued to retreat, falling to \$366,900, down from the recent peak of \$413,800 in June.

More recently, mortgage rates have declined, falling to 6.15 percent in mid January. There remains a large gap between 30-year mortgage rates and the 10-year Treasury yield, suggesting there could be more room for mortgage rates to drop. Still, while home sales could bottom out soon, it's unlikely that lower rates most homeowners have on their current mortgages, limiting the amount of newly listed homes. Consequently, the low supply of homes for sale (and poor affordability) should continue to limit sales activity.

#### GDP growth should end 2022 strong

The U.S. economy should expand 3.2 percent (annualized) in Q4, following the same growth rate in Q3. An expected 3.0 percent (annualized) increase in real consumer spending should be the mail driver of real GDP, contributing about 2.1 points to total growth. However, as the recent retail sales data confirm, the strength in consumer spending momentum as we exited 2022 cooled sharply. The sector providing the next largest boost to GDP is likely inventories, which does not represent a healthy mix since the rise in inventories is unwanted. As companies across the retail and wholesale sectors attempt to work down their inventories, it will weigh on new orders and production in early 2023. The main drag on activity in Q4 should be from residential investment as it contracts for the seventh straight quarter due to high mortgage rates and still elevated prices.

Core durable goods should show business investment is slowing

Durable goods likely rebounded 1.5 percent in December following a 2.1 percent decline in November. A recovery in aircraft orders should lead the way following a 30 percent plunge in November. The core readings for orders and shipments-nondefense capital goods excluding aircraft-likely declined modestly, indicating that businesses pulled back on their investment reins at the end of last year due to concerns about weakening aggregate demand and a looming recession.

Consumer spending falls in December while income rises modestly

Consumer spending in nominal and real terms should each contract 0.2 percent in December as consumers' wallets are pinched by still high inflation, elevated borrowing rates, and the drawdown in pandemic-related savings. The weak December retail sales indicate that goods consumption continues to decline, leaving the services sector as the main engine of strength. The December employment data point to a modest 0.2 percent increase in private wages and salaries and overall personal income as average hourly earnings posted just a

0.3 percent rise and the average workweek declined. The saving rate should rise modestly from the very low 2.3 percent rate posted in November. The PCE price index likely was unchanged on the month, allowing the year-on-year rate to decelerate to 5.0 percent from 5.5 percent in November. The core PCE price index should rise 0.3 percent, slowing the year-on-year pace to 4.4 percent from 4.7 percent in November.
